President's Message

With Spring here, it is time to plan and implement the projects and ideas that have come up over the past year. In addition, we would like to sincerely thank Mr. Wilmer Marks and Mr. John Watson for their work as past directors.

The big item is the reconstruction of our wharf which should be completed by the end of April. This has been a complicated and ongoing project but thanks to the hard work and dedication of all the committee members, a replacement structure has been put in place. We would like to especially thank Ron Kriese without whom this construction project could not have been undertaken or completed with the funds we had available.

Last fall, several community members volunteered, along with Lloyd Porteous and his excavator, to place a drainage system around the north and east side of the hall to correct our drainage problem. This was to compliment the work done by Ron Kriese and his crew and machinery in installing the main outlet drain and dry well.

The community applied for and received a \$6350.00 grant from the BC Gaming commission to cover some of our operating costs plus purchase some more new tables—we plan on 10 new tables and 96 padded stacking chairs. This along with receiving notice of a further \$2000.00 Grant in Aid from the CSRD means we will have funds to construct a storage area for the tables & chairs at the end of the wheelchair ramp so as to be accessible directly from within the hall and free up more area in the hall itself.

The Summer Sizzler last year was a well organized success that again was only possible through the hard work of a dedicated group of volunteers. This function provides our only large influx of funds, other than grants when available to keep our Association going. The plan is to host a Summer Sizzler this summer – but this can only happen if we can count on our volunteers.

There were a limited number of winter events, the first of which was a special Remembrance Day service. Helena Davidson and her theatre group again put on a Christmas production that lived up to the standard her group has set. Leeann Herechuk and her volunteers organized another great New Year's dance & celebration—thanks to all involved. There were some games nights organized throughout the winter and while I am sure people would like to see more events, we need new volunteers to step up to organize these—our core group can only do so much & we really need volunteers so people don't get "burned out"—especially with our small winter population.

Our General Meeting is to be held on Sunday, May 20th @ 10:00 am. We hope to see as many members as possible there. Also we ask that, with so many directors planning on not running for re-election, you would consider who you would like to see running our community for our Annual General Meeting on Labour Day Weekend.

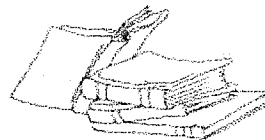
In February, we held our General Meeting & pot luck supper at the Seymour River Guest Ranch. Thanks again to Harry & Monica Schrott for hosting.

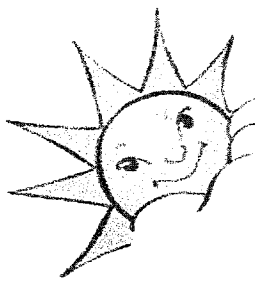
Friends of the Library

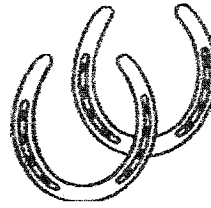
